In the past twelve months the centre has grown with new groups established. We have over 2,293 people visiting the centre every month to access various groups and services.

The Study Buddies program continues at the centre. The Community Development Worker, Suzanne has created a positive and trusting environment for the children to work on their homework. Because of funding short falls, it has become a challenge to continue with this program. We will continue looking for opportunities in raising funds to continue this worthwhile program into the future and to increase attendance.

The Community Services Network Group has become stronger after conducting their 5th successful Neighbourhood Week Event. Monthly meetings to plan for the Neighbourhood Week event have helped to develop networks, partnerships and the sharing of resources and information. The group will work towards ongoing planning for next year's event.

Special mention must be made of the community luncheon which was held during our events week. It was a wonderful example of community engagement and friendship building. A wide variety of cultural backgrounds was represented along with associated dishes. It was a delightful occasion which drew overwhelmingly positive feedback. We hope to repeat this outcome next year.

We would like to thank our local ward councillors Cr Shaw, Cr Chedid and Cr Hugh for facilitating the funding for remediating the land on the new block and the provision of the much needed and appreciated toilet block, for the John Irving Park Community Garden. 
1,000 quarterly newsletters were hand delivered by our volunteers and collected from the centre. We have developed a large email list of community members and organisations, who are interested in being on our email list.

The playgroup meets every Monday excluding school holidays. This is a very popular and successful program. The mothers tell me that

they are forming long lasting friendships and appreciate the opportunity to meet at the centre.

John Irving Park Community Garden

The John Irving Park Community Garden at Jordan Street Rosehill is well established and well used with many in the community enjoying the amenities.

We now have 27 plots that are fully operational, with a mix of community members and community agencies with a current waiting list of 12 community gardeners.



Bunnings Lidcombe has supported us throughout the year with donations of



tools, seeds and potted annual flowers. At the Neighbourhood Week event at the garden, Dee the activity organiser gave a workshop on potting and also donated prizes for a free raffle. Every one that attended had a happy time sharing garden tips and gardening information. A big thank you to Bunnings Lidcombe, for their generosity towards,

contributing to the community garden.

We are currently waiting on Council to remediate the section of land at the top of the new block, by creating a native reserve for use as a recreational resource with seats and a water feature provided for quiet reflection. The remainder of land will provide plots, toilet and a green house/potting shed.

This year with Parramatta City Council financial support and Optus Rock Corps we have been able to install 15 new garden plots at the new block.



There is currently a high demand to garden and a growing waiting list. This is because of the high rate of apartment living within the Parramatta LGA that will continue into the future.

The community garden is a great opportunity to encourage community partnerships, friendships and cultivate and educate new gardeners that come from various parts of the world.

Harris Park Neighbourhood Week Event

This year the Harris Park Neighbourhood week network organised four days of events for Neighbourhood Week. The working group met every month to organise this event, there were representatives from various services

Learn to ride/Ride through the heritage areas of Harris Park

Addvantageous provided Austcycle to the community. The participants learnt how to ride a bike safely, including riding in traffic and the importance of



wearing safety gear. This activity has proven to be very popular with local families enjoying the fresh air while their children learn to ride a bicycle. It is the second year the Community Services Network have partnered with Addvantageous to provide the bikes and knowledge with the support of the local Police

Neighbourhood Week Welcome Lunch

This year we held a community luncheon at the Harris Park Community Centre.

The luncheon was very well received with over 40 people. Each person provided a traditional dish to share with others they also provided a description of the dish and how it was made. We partnered with the Harris Park Community Services, who invited their clients, friends and people who were interested in meeting other cultural groups while sharing their food and stories. This was also an opportunity for the community services to inform the local community of services that are available to them.



Plans for 2016

- The 2015 Harris Park Neighbourhood Week community event was very successful. The Harris Park Network of Community Services, have agreed to continue planning for 2016.
 - The network of services go from strength to strength, with building relationships, sharing knowledge and resources, the group look forward to working together for the community and developing further opportunities to form partnerships with the common goal of educating and resourcing the local community.
- The plans are in place to update our current Strategic Plan, to insure that we are in step with all new Local, State and Federal policies eg: NDIS, DV awareness programs and youth programs.
- Next year we plan to partner with the Community Service Order Scheme to assist us in the maintenance of the John Irving Park Community Garden.
- We will continue to raise funds in 2016 for Homework Help program. This
 program is very popular in the local area for support for primary school
 student's homework.
- In the new year we plan to complete the Green House and under cover paving at the Community Garden.
- Because of the increasing number of isolated seniors with in Parramatta LGA we are hoping to formulate some appropriate activities to cater for this growing group of people.
- We will maintain our efforts in providing the best possible outcomes for our community and our clients.

Report on the Financial Report
